Further to my WOM/3561 dated 19th March, I have to inform you that I have now heard from the Foreign Office. Unfortunately, however, as I had forecast in my previous letter, they have confirmed that as your husband was a Dutch national they are not in a position to take the matter up with the Soviet Authorities. Any action taken must be done by the Netherlands Authorities through their Ambassador in Moscow. It would therefore be necessary for your husband's relatives in Holland to get the fullest possible details from de Bruin and have the matter put in the hands of the Netherlands Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

I am so sorry not to have been able to help you in a more positive manner, but I am sure that you will understand the position, and if there is any further way in which I can be of service to you please do not hesitate to write to me.

I am sure that you will understand the position, as I thought it would probably be easier and quicker for us to approach them than for you. I am still waiting their comments, but I rather fear that it will be difficult - if not impossible - for them to make effective enquiries from the Soviet Authorities.

Dear Madam,

I am sorry to have been so long in writing again to you - as I promised to do in my last letter to you dated 28th February - but I wished to make enquiries in various quarters.

I have found that the information that your husband Hendrik Sebes had been executed at Mauthausen on the 6th September, 1944, was, in the first instance, obtained from German sources and was subsequently confirmed by an entry in the Camp records. Independent witnesses have since confirmed that he was in fact amongst the 39 Dutch nationals who were executed on the date mentioned. Unless, therefore, he managed in some way to outwit the Camp Authorities I fear there is very little doubt that he was in fact killed at Mauthausen.

I have, however, passed the information which you gave us in your letter of 22nd January to the Foreign Office and asked them for their views on the matter, as I thought it would probably be easier and quicker for us to approach them than for you to do so through your M.P. I am still awaiting their comments, but I rather fear that they will inform us that as your husband was a Dutch national it will be difficult - if not impossible - for them to make effective enquiries from the Soviet Authorities.

I apologise for the delay in replying to your letter of the 24th July. This was unavoidable due to my being absent for a few days.

The replies to the various points raised by you are as follows:

WILL: We cannot trace that any Will was deposited with the War Office prior to your client's husband's departure from this country. We have a form completed in his own handwriting but unsigned, according to which all his property is to go to his wife. We attach this form in original for your inspection and return, and also a copy and a translation for your retention.

ACCUMULATED PAY: The balance standing to the credit of his account, after crediting pay up to 31 May 1945 (the month in which news of death was received) and allowing for all payments to your client including the £20 which is being sent to her to-day is £1065.11.9. This consists of:

RANK: We cannot trace that the deceased was granted officially the rank of 2nd Lt. in the Netherlands Forces, but understand that this was a courtesy rank.

Dear Mrs. Sebes:

Thank you for your letter of the 13th July.

We have been deeply grieved to learn through Capt. de Graaf's service of the death of your husband. This very sad news must naturally be a great blow to you, and we should like to express our deepest sympathy with you in your loss, as well as to say how much we admire the gallantry of your husband and the others who have given their lives for Holland.

To turn to the question of your husband's personal affairs, we wish to inform you that even after allowing for the monthly sums of £20 regularly sent to you up to the present time, there is still an appreciable amount of accumulated pay in our hands.

We are entitled to pay this sum only to the executor of your late husband's will, provided he left a will. If he did not, then presumably you will apply for letters of administration. In any case we would strongly advise you to consult a reliable solicitor as soon as possible. You may like to suggest to him that he should write to Capt. Mills at the above address.

In the meantime, and as a temporary measure, the monthly £20 will continue to be paid to you.

Kindly let us hear from you as soon as you can, so that there may be a minimum of delay in settling the matter. We shall do all we can to assist you and very much regret the sad circumstances which have occasioned this painful task for you.
